A delicious roast beef dinner was served to about 550 guests by future alumni members, the class of '81. Many more joined the crowd for the program.

Winifred Shaw Johnson ('39) provided dinner music on the organ, and also accompanied the soloists during the program.

The memorial service to honor the deceased members of the honored classes was led by Charlene Scott Mahnke ('56) and Linda Butler Morrison ('63).

Mike Furmanski, '67, was the master-of-ceremonies for the "get re-acquainted" time which followed.

The out-of-state visitors were heard from, with Mary Eleanor Mudd ('30) taking honors for traveling the farthest distance to "be home" for Alumni. However, Bud Wehrman ('40) of Darien, Conn.; Virginia Weinman Oberg ('40) of Eugene, Ore.; Nellie Hartman Lewis and her husband Clark, both class of '40 of Salem, Ore.; Paula Geiser Martin of Tenn. and Cindy Olin Holst of Eden Prarie, Minn. (both class of '70); along with those from Alabama, Texas, Illinois, Calif. and many other states have to be

The largest class present was the honored class of 1940 with twenty-two in attendance. Returning faculty included Irma Jane-Sanders (1929 - 1946) of Anselmo and Opal Ervin Hoback.

Third generation graduates included the families of Smith. Lucas. Deterding, Hircock and Watson. The class of '80 included several who joined the 3rd generation ranks: Joni Davenport, her mother Sherry Hircock Davenport '57, and grandmother

Freda Bowers Hircock '31: Cleo Spratt Deterding '27 added two more to her family group - Earl '80 son of Eddie '56, and Cindy Crow '80 daughter of Pat Deterding Crow '53: and a new 3rd generation family is John '28 and Mary Worrell Tryon '31, Susan Tryon Sanford '61 and Susanne Sanford '80.

The honored classes were introduced with the class of '30 having 16 of the 24 still living members present, class of '40 had 22, class of '50 had 10, class of '60 with 10 and class of '70 had 20. During this introduction we learned that the class of '30 would like to have an elevator installed to the stage; that Bud Wehrman's jacket matched Mike Furmanski's pants; that Mona Sargent Crow giggles just like she did 30 years ago; and that John Phillips "Scott" was present and accounted for. The Class of 1980 were inducted into the alumni (just walking across the stage was an initiation in itself) and Randy Blincow presented the class picture to the alumni association. The program, coming from

station WAHS, 1980 on the dial with disc jockey Jerry Ahrens, gave a variety of commercials and music. Rosella Beatty Geiser sang two songs from the 20's; Margaret Tullis Beatty sang from the 30's and the 70's; Gaylene Garrison Weber sang from the 40's; the Barbershop Quartet of John Ahrens, David Blevins, Dick Bassett and Don Hardin sang from the 60's and Gene "Elvis" Tullis had all the girls swooning when he sang "Love Me Tender". The Oscar "Myer" guy who couldn't remember the words; the Leggs' gal who had a leg that could dance all night; a "How Hot It Is!" guy who lost his shirt; a Charmin gal who got shot; Hawaiian Punch people; the Hanes all-under ladies; the Piece of the Rock egg; the Dakor Oven happy family; and Charlie Roth's "I could have had a V-8" were the ads that paid for the show! 1931 CLASS MEMOIR

"I found some records too dark and mysterious for the ears of the underclassmen to hear. Others have records so blank that even the best historian could not extract one iota of history from them."

The above is an excerpt for the class history of the class of '31.

But the 28 seniors who graduated from Arnold High on May 13, 1931 made history especially during their senior year.

Now they had a sneak day that was really a day! The class met at the Red. White and Blue Garage at 5:00 A.M., piled into the back of a truck, drove to Broken Bow to eat breakfast and then traveled on to Keamey to spend the whole day. The first ring they needed to do when they got to Kearney was to find restrooms. So off to the depot they went, and when the girls found out they were "pay booths", they knew they couldn't afford to use their money this way - so they crawled under the doors to get into the booths. In the afternoon they attended the movie "Daybreak" and toured

the 1733 Ranch, which at that time claimed the largest barn in the world. They then drove to Lexington, where they saw the movie "Resurrection" and arrived home at 1:00 A.M. - tired and dirty.

The day they had their senior pictures taken was another big day. The entire class went to North Platte, and along with having their pictures taken, toured the Paramount Theater which was being built, attended a movie at the Fox Theater, and ate dinner out.

Students could bring 10 cents a week and attend all of the school activities.

Their Junior-Senior Banquet was "A Garden In The Rain". Rev. L. S. Burnham gave the

Baccalaureate address.

Mr. Hare and Miss Sanders were very special teachers - you may have entered their classes not knowing anything, but you didn't come out that way.

Their class rings cost \$7.00, and that was high!

Dark and mysterious, maybe, but blank spaces? Never! Not the Class of '31.
