Alumni Association Endorses Arnold Rotary Club Project

The Rotary Club would like to appeal to the Arnold Alumni Association to assist them in their endeavor by alerting alumni members to help Arnold citizens further their education by contributing to the loan fund. Your outreach to peop?s who care about education is vast; therefore, you are in a position to help promote an educational trust which will help alleviate student anxiety over financial aid.
