The Cardinal was the best friend and encouragement to approximately 2,300 students as they went through AHS, along with the many citizens of the area, as they cheered our many athletic teams to victory, good sportsmanship and Arnold pride!

"Who's gonna win, win? Who's gonna win, win? Who's gonna win tonight? Cards! Cards! Cards!" was just one of the familiar yells as we rooted for the Arnold Cardinals.

Several different students took on the character of The Cardinal, bringing him into action at football, volleyball and basketball games, at pep rallies and for special occasions.

The terminal illness of The Cardinal came about in the fall of 2009, when it was decided that Arnold and Callaway would co-op sports, making it necessary for a new mascot to be born.

Along with the end of the Cardinal era, we also see the end of our school song at various sporting events. However, it will live forever in the hearts and minds of Arnold High alumni!

In 1997, when Arnold citizens heard that Senior Class member Adam Hornung was going to study law, no one was surprised. After all, he was known for liking a good argument.



## Revisiting the '09 Banquet

There are two important items to get out of the way before I begin to tell you about the wonderful 2009 Alumni banquet and program. First item: be careful what you talk about when you are sitting next to the local paper's reporter, who happens to have a pencil in her hand and is writing things down. (I will forever have something to hold over the "Cole girls," Carolyn Cole Geiser, Pat Cole Smith, and Betty Bean Cole.) The second item is that alumni need to get a petition to the governor, or perhaps even the United State Congress, to pass a law banning such things as weddings, high school or college graduations, track meets - all of those minor events - on the weekend of an Arnold Alumni.

After months of early morning and late evening meetings, phone calls, letters, and work by the officers and others involved to make everything ready for them, the 2009 alumni members started coming home in mid-week, and with class reunions held on Friday night, some all day Saturday, some just afternoon and evening, and several carrying over to Sunday, it was truly a time of re-living old memories and making new ones.

The evening dinner meal, with Windsor chops as the main course, was planned and served under the guidance of Dan Eastburn, with much help in the kitchen and serving line. Approximately 525 enjoyed the excellent dinner.

President Joe Bob Atkins began the evening program by thanking a good friend for nominating him for the office the year before. A time of remem-

bering deceased alumni from the honored classes and those who passed away in the past year (or the Association just learned of their death in that time) was presented by power point.

Lea Ann Edelman represented the Arnold School Foundation and gave a yearly report.

Joe Bob then introduced the Master of Ceremonies, Mike Reed, Class of 1994, who everyone learned was a school bus driver while he was still in school - hm-m-m, wonder how that happened? Mike then shared with us some of the wonderful things he remembered about his quality education at Arnold High, such as Shanon Koubek bringing his "beverage of choice" on a school field trip, Shawn Phillips giving a speech on world affairs by reading that section from the daily paper, and asking the question concerning the

"Arnold Hotties" calendar about why Dan Blowers was hugging a dead deer.

The parade of honored classes was then held. The Class of '29 members are now all deceased. The Class of '39 paraded by with six members out of the 12 remaining in attendance, giving them a 50% rating, which is very good for a 70 year class. The Class of '49 had 15 out of 25 in attendance, giving them 60% rating, and giving them top honors for attendance. The Class of '59 earned a 59% rating with 15 out of 22 present. The Class of '69 had 16 out of the 32 remaining members in attendance, which netted them 50%. A 47% was earned by the Class of '79, who had 15 of their 32 remaining members present, and 46% by the Class of '89 with 13 out of 28 present. The Class of '99 had three guys out of the 13 present - and we thank you,

David, Justin, and Cam! Our newest members had five of their 18 members present to be welcomed into the Alumni Association. There were also five members of the Class of 1934, who are members of 75 years' standing, who attended.

A number of out-of-state guests stood to let their presence be known, and it was decided that Jerry Story from Alaska was probably the guest who traveled the greatest distance. Several former teachers were present, and I hesitate to name these as I could not see all who stood, but I know that Marilyn Brohman, Dick Bassett, Bonnie Rose, and Marion Fuller Nelson were in attendance.

We then took a journey "Down Memory Lane" via the program, planned and narrated by Melody Larreau Jennings. Irv Jennings, who Melody describes as a loose can-

non, helped with the narration. Irv first presented Melody with a bouquet for all of her stressful work, and we all hope that no one was missing a bouquet from one of their graves that they had decorated.

Minnie Pearl (Dorothy Larreau) came out to welcome the guests to the program, and Don and John Hardin sang the favorite song composed by John, "Home to the Sandhills." For each honored year facts were then given about that year such as the price of gas, a car, a house, etc., along with favorite music. "Over the Rainbow" was sung by Dorothy Larreau, accompanied by Winifred Shaw Pandorf. Although we didn't hear the song we learned that "Maresy Doats" was a favorite song in 1949. An appearance by Mr. Story (Terry Mills) in his bow tie and hitting

his fist into his hand gave some people good cause to remember the good old days. The Class of '59 then stood up to be recognized as being the class that made the administration decide there would be no more Senior Sneak Days. The Eberly Brothers (John and Don) came out to sing "Dream" and "Bye Bye Love." The next scene from 1969 showed what happened when Mr. Story met two girls (Pam Lamberty Long and Jimi Cole) in the hallway with short skirts and his tape measure. Another school scene showed how a class full of rowdy kids (Briana Mills, April Mills, Jimi Cole, Jake Gilland, and Edward Walker) could settle down when Mr. Story came into the room. In 1979 we saw Mrs. Hill (Debbie Bean Brosius)

brandishing her famous wooden spoons to get her point across to the same school kids. In 1989 the same kids gave Mrs. Brown a start by putting the desks on the roof of the school. In 1999 we learned how one student put an Alka Seltzer in his mouth, got it to fizzing, and fell to the floor. They reported that Mrs. Mohr was very startled. The year 2009 had clips from one of the favorite TV shows, "Dancing With the Stars." The first contestants were Glen Weinman and Jean Weinman Thunker, doing a sort of western dance - which promptly got bonged by the judges, (Trudy Smith Van Camp, Floyd Ondrak, and Jake Gilland). The next contestants were Kent and Sue DeLosh (actually Jim and Pam Long), and they got sent out quite quickly. Crowd pleasers were the third contestants, Duane

ing in the Arnold area. Seventy years! Where have all those years gone? It doesn't seem possible it can be that long ago.

The fall after graduation, I taught school at Wayside, a country school, located between Merna and Anselmo. I loved teaching and working with children. My cousin and I went to California in June of 1941 and that ended my teaching career. I returned to Nebraska in 1943 with my baby son.

My teaching certificate had expired and I would have had to go to college in order to renew it. That I couldn't do. In February 1945, I started to beauty school at Capital Beauty School in Omaha, and on

November 1, 1945, I started a nearly 65-year career as a beautician in Broken Bow. Except for a two year hiatus, I have been in Broken Bow ever since. I am mostly retired but still do some work in my shop and also at the rest home. I have one customer I have done for more than 64 years, a 1935 graduate of Arnold High School, Beulah Beckler LeLa Cheur.

In August of 1975, I left Broken Bow, moved to Washington, DC, lived with my daughter and attended college at Northern Virginia Community College. It was a wonderful experience and was truly the happiest two years of my life. I always loved going

to school and I so enjoyed the college experience.

I returned to Broken Bow in July of 1977 and started working at the Central Nebraska Medical Clinic, an experience I greatly enjoyed. I eventually returned full time to my beauty shop.

My son, Larry, retired as manager of an electrical contracting company, and his wife, Sharon, a retired teacher from the Omaha Public School system, and they live in Omaha. My grandson, Grant, works for the Nebraska State Historical Society and lives in Lincoln. Joana, my granddaughter, is finishing her second year as a teacher in the Omaha school system and her husband, Lesley, works at

Offutt Air Force Base and they live in Omaha. They will present me my first great-grandchild in April. Linda, my daughter, retired after nearly 50 years of working for the federal government in Washington DC. She has an all purpose store in the unincorporated village of Waterford, VA, a village on the National Register of Historic Places.

While living in Washington DC, I became interested in genealogy. I did a great deal of research at the Library of Congress, DAR Library, Branch Library of the Mormon church and courthouses. I had hoped to one day make a

trip to Sweden, Denmark and England to do family research. An event on June 7, 1991, changed those plans. I became legally blind from macular degeneration. It has been a difficult 18 plus years, but one learns to cope and so I have. I have learned to do what I can and not worry about what I can't do. I still live alone, take care of my own business and appreciate the help I receive from family and friends.

In August of 1975, I attended the wedding of my niece in Hawaii. The highlight of that trip was visiting the Arizona Memorial and being able to see the outline of the ship and finding the name of a young man from Broken Bow, Charles Lomax, on the list of over 1,000 young men still entombed in the Arizona. While living in Washington, I attended a stage play in New York, the Black adaptation of The Wizard of Oz, titled "The Wiz." I walked in Central Park, which once belonged to my ancestors, walked up Fifth Avenue, saw the building where the New Year's Eve ball is dropped to usher in the new year and walked past Rockefeller Center.

On January 17, 2006, I had a bit of a setback. I was struck by a car as I was crossing the street and spent the next four months in the hospital and rest home. Life goes on but a bit slower. I am sure we all had hopes and dreams and plans we wanted to do, but time has slipped away with some of the things not done. I feel privileged to have graduated from Arnold High School and have been able to live in Central Nebraska among the most wonderful people anywhere. It has been a good life.

I plan to attend the Alumni Banquet and I am looking forward to seeing my classmates.

It's hard to believe it has been 50 years since we graduated, but the calendar doesn't lie. I'll try to give a report on what has taken place in my life.




