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### From the Principal's Desk

I hope you all had a relaxing summer, and are gearing up for classes to begin on August 16.

### **ELEMENTARY PLANNING**

We are doing things a bit differently the first couple of days this fall in the elementary school. It became clear that our elementary teachers needed more time than was normally available to analyze initial assessments and place students in correct reading groups to begin the year. Therefor, we will have all students in Grades K-5 report on Friday, August 16. Then, they will have Monday, August 19 off, so the teachers can visit and get placements correct. They will come back for "business as usual" on Tuesday, Aug 20.

Students in Grades 6-12 will begin on August 16 and be on the regular schedule. They DO NOT have Monday, August 19 off; they will report just as normal. Some changes for students at this level include Middle School level planner use and incentive reward parties. There is an article addressing this change elsewhere in this publication.

### **ACADEMIC EXPECTATIONS**

For students in grades 9-12, there may be some slight changes to

Valedictorian and Salutatorian requirements. In general, we have been concerned about student apathy, or simply not caring about getting their schoolwork done well and on time. We feel we must set minimum expectations to earn the honor of Valedictorian and Salutatorian. New criteria can be found in a separate article in this newsletter.

### PARENT ORGANIZATION

We are hoping for even more parental and community involvement in school. Lana Cool has agreed to help organize a Parent organization, and the staff has provided her with some great ideas to become involved in helpful ways with each teacher. In addition, TeamMates is continually processing applications to become mentors, so if you are interested in becoming involved as a TeamMates mentor, contact Leron Bierman.

# **Changes to Honors Courses for Graduation**

The school board discussed ways to address student apathy toward schoolwork during the June board meeting. Apathy towards schoolwork means that you have very little drive or ambition to complete schoolwork beyond the level of "passing" or being satisfied with less that your best.

Some ideas that were discussed included no longer awarding Valedictorian and Salutatorian Honors, as several schools have. Also discussed briefly was setting minimum GPA standards to receive that honor, but both of these ideas were not really supported by anyone.

What was supported, however, was adding additional incentive for students to take the "upper-level" courses, those courses beyond what is required in core areas, and take advantage of the op-

portunity to earn dual credit by making those courses "weighted" toward a GPA. What this would mean is that if you took Chemistry, for example, and received an "A" it would count as 4.2 toward your GPA, rather than a 4.0. This would enable students to increase their GPA to higher levels by taking advantage of our challenging courses, and increase their opportunity to gain acceptance to colleges of their choice and/or earn additional scholarships.

The details have not been worked out yet, but should be ready by the beginning of the school year. I will explain them to everyone on the first day of school. You will have the first week of school to drop and add courses if you would like to register for a course that might increase your GPA. A list of those courses will be provided for you.





### Middle School Incentive Parties

There will be some changes to Incentive Parties for the Middle School students at APS for the 2013-14 school year.

As you know, we have been having monthly parties for kids who meet criteria regarding academic achievement, attendance, and promptness. We have decided that what really needs to be addressed in students of the "tween" age is organization and time management. In order to support this effort, we will be rewarding based on those ideas.

First of all, at the beginning of the school year, students will be given a planner, so parents don't need to buy one on their own. Students will be required to fill out the planner with their assignments on a daily basis. There is a new white board outside of Mrs. Badgley's classroom where assignments for students in Grades 6-8 will be

posted, so if a student doesn't get the planner filled out in class, they can do it later in the day.

The planners will then be initialed by teachers on a weekly basis, indicating that all work has been completed and handed in. At the end of each month, students with all of their teacher's initials for the entire month will be eligible for the incentive party. Middle School students or parents will plan the parties, which will last about 90 minutes, and vary by time of day each month. Students who do not meet eligibility for the party will have to report to a classroom for study time while the party is taking place.

# NeSA Writing Score Report

The results are in, and the news is good. Arnold Public Schools have scored well on NeSA writing scores, even with the new, more rigorous scoring methods being applied across all tested grade levels.

The Writing assessment is taken by 4th, 8th, and 11th grade students in every school across the state. This year, APS tested 28 students in these three grades. Twenty-three of the twenty eight were found to be meeting or exceeding the standards, while only five fell below the mark. Teacher and student preparation across all grades levels certainly contribute to this success. Notably, we received two "perfect" scores this year, which is a rare occurrence.

The results of this assessment will be taken into consideration, along with NeSA Reading, Math, and Science scores, to determine our overall Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) score, which will be released by the NDE in the fall, just about the time school begins for the 2013-2014 school year.


their individual letters. If he/she makes it, they will be able to participate in the incentive party.

Each child must reach his/her goal by July 31st. The incentive party will be on August 6th. You are able to track your child's progress by logging in to their AR account and click on view goals and points.


# SOUND CHART FOR FEMALES



### Offer Versus Serve in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs


Offer Versus Serve (OVS) is a serving option that applies to menu planning and the determination of reimbursable school meals in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National School Breakfast (SBP) and Lunch Programs (NSLP). OVS cannot be utilized in the Afterschool Snack Program.

The USDA meal patterns include five food components: Meat/Meat Alternate, Grains, Fruits, Vegetables and Milk. OVS allows students to decline a certain number of food components in the meal, reducing food waste and food costs and allowing students to select the foods they prefer to eat. OVS must be implemented in senior high schools for lunch. OVS is optional for junior high, middle schools and elementary schools.

### OVS Requirements for Lunch - Effective SY 2012-13

For a lunch to be reimbursable under OVS, schools must meet the following criteria:

- All <u>five food components</u> must be offered to all students (meat/meat alternate; grains; fruits; vegetables; and low-fat (1%) or fat-free milk.
- Serving sizes for all food components must equal the required quantity for the different grade groups in the NSLP meal pattern.
- Meals must be priced as a unit, i.e., students pay the same price regardless of whether they take three, four or five food components.
- Students decide which foods to decline, if any. Students must be allowed to decline up to two food components.
- All students must take at least three of the five food components offered, including at least a 1/2 cup serving of fruit or vegetable and full servings of the other selected food components. Students may take smaller portions of the declined food components; however, they do not count towards a reimbursable meal.
  - When the meat/meat alternate is provided in two menu items (such as a Cheese Stick and Yogurt), the student must take at least the minimum daily serving size depending on the grade group. For grades K-5 and 6-8: 1 oz.; for grades 9-12 grades: 2 oz.
  - When the meal includes multiple grain items and the student selects more than one (e.g., 1/2 cup of pasta and a one-ounce roll), only one grain counts as a reimbursable component toward the OVS requirements.



A <u>food component</u> is one of the five food groups that comprise the reimbursable meal; including meat/meat alternate, grains, fruits, vegetables and milk. A <u>food item</u> is a specific food offered within the five food components. The chart below summarizes the meal pattern requirements and the number of food components that students can decline.

Must offer Five Components <sup>1</sup>	Student May Decline
<ul> <li>One serving of meat/meat alternate</li> <li>One serving of grains</li> <li>One serving of fruits</li> <li>One serving of vegetables</li> <li>One serving of low-fat (1%) unflavored milk or fat-free flavored or unflavored milk</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Up to two food components</li> <li>Must take at least 1/2 cup serving of fruit or vegetable</li> </ul>

### OVS Requirements for Breakfast - Effective School Year 2013-14

Offer Versus Serve is not required at breakfast but strongly recommended in order to cut down on plate waste. If Offer Versus Serve is not implemented, students must leave the serving line with all food components. For a breakfast to be reimbursable under OVS, schools must meet the following criteria:

- The meal must be planned to include the three required components: Grains, Fruit/Vegetable and Milk.
- For all grade groups:
  - Schools must offer at least a 1 ounce equivalent (oz. eq.) of grains daily
  - Schools may offer meat/meat alternate in place of part of the grain component after the minimum daily grain requirement is met.
  - Schools must offer 1/2 cup of fruit, vegetable or 100% juice. There are no juice limits. Students are not required to take this component.
- Serving sizes for all food components must equal the required quantity for the different grade groups in the SBP meal pattern.
- Meals must be priced as a unit, i.e., students pay the same price regardless of whether they take three or four items.
- Students must take full servings of at least three of the four food items offered. Students may take a smaller portion of the declined food item; however, it does not count towards a reimbursable meal.
- Students may decline any one food item.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. **Arnold Public School** offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1,25-K-12; lunch costs \$2,25-K-6; \$2,50-7-12. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced-price is \$.30 for breakfast and \$.40 for lunch.

If your child(ren) qualified for free or reduced-price meals at the end of last school year, you must submit a new application by Sept. 27, 2013, in order to avoid an interruption in meal benefits.

Frequently asked questions and answers:

### 1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child?

No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced-price meals. Use one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Penny Allen, Arnold Public Schools, P.O. Box 399, Arnold NE 69120.

### 2. Who can get free meals?

All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.

### 3. Can foster children get free meals?

Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.

### 4. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals?

Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call [school, homeless liaison or migrant coordinator information] to see if they qualify.

### 5. Who can get reduced price meals?

Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart shown with this application.

### 6. Should I fill out an application if I received a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free meals?

Please read the letter carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 308-848-2226 ext.4 if you have questions.

# 7. My child's application was approved last year for meal benefits. Do I need to fill out another one? Yes, your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.

### 8. I receive WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals?

Children in households participating in WIC <u>may</u> be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out an application.

### 9. Will the information I give be checked?

Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.

### 10. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later?

Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free or reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

### 11. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application?

You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Dawn Lewis, 308-848-2226 or Arnold Public Schools, P.O. Box 399, Arnold, NE 69120.

### 12. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen?

Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.

### 13. Who should I include as members of my household?

You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.

### 14. What if my income is not always the same?

List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you make \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.

### 15. We are in the military. Do we include our housing allowance as income?

If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.

### 16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. Is his combat pay counted as income?

No, if the combat pay is received in addition to his basic pay because of his deployment and it wasn't received before he was deployed, combat pay is not included as income. Contact your school for more information.

### 17. My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for?

The income to be recorded is income derived from the business venture less operating costs incurred in the generation of that income. Deductions for personal expenses, such as interest on home mortgages, medical expenses and other similar non-business items are <u>not</u> allowed in reducing gross business income.

USDA has announced that **losses** (negative numbers) on the lines listed below can be used to determine the **total** income for this attachment. If the total income is a negative number, it must then be recorded as zero on the application in the category labeled "All Other Income".

Zero income resulting from the use of Form 1040 does not require follow-up.

Please note: Line **7** cannot be reported as current income. Income from wages or salaries must be reported on the application for the most recent month.

Line 22 (total income) and line 37 (adjusted gross income) may not be used for purposes of applying for free and reduced-price meals.
