SCHOOL REVAMPED DURING SUMMER

After discussing frequently and finally getting the seal of approval, Arnold Public Schools is finally getting some long-awaited renovations done during the summer of 2017.

The first part of the renova-

tion includes fixing the roof over the elementary side. It's known as section D, and includes the office, wrestling, and music rooms. Workers will take the rocks off the

Another addition to the school are the HVAC (air conditioning systems), which will be installed in the 6th grade, guidance, Title 1, Art, and shop classrooms with their own unit. The office will receive one unit for themselves. In addition, a new boiler will be placed out in the shop in replace of the old one.

Another huge part of the remodeling is fixing the kitchen. The kitchen currently has a drain that goes under the current gym floor, and workers are to reroute the plumbing out of the building. They are rearranging the kitchen to accommodate; for example, the dishwasher will move and the room

Everyone in the school has been buzzing about the renovations since they were announced at an April 12th meeting. There has been talk circulating for a long time about them, and now that it's finally happening, the school could not be more excited.

With these additions, the school will have a more open feel and give the look of more space within the school without actually adding more space.

After a quick update, the following girls will be your SLB cheerleaders for the 2017-2018 school year:



A big thank you from the students of Arnold Public Schools to Duane and Carolyn Bowers and Tony and Krista Eggleston for the beef that arrived last spring.

The "Beef In Schools" program that was kicked off during football playoffs of 2016 has finally come together. The first meal that was served that was using local beef was a student favorite, beef and noodles.

There were students actually noticed a difference in the flavor! The sophomore class said that more of then ate school lunch on the day local beef was served compared to their normal numbers.

"I first noticed it because it tasted better than usual, and I didn't know that we were using local beef until after," said Landon Furne, a then junior.

To start the program off, Tony and Krista Eggleston donated a quarter beef to use as a fund raiser/raffle to help pay for the processing of the beef itself. Duane and Carolyn Bowers donated the first calf to be butchered. To donate a calf, it must be at least 36 months to three years old. One the calf is donated, either Jerry Cool, Merle Bierman, or Tony Eggleston is to inspect the animal. Then, it is taken for processing after. If you have an older critter that you would like to donate, the men are able to take it to the sale barn and sell it. Once it has made a profit, the proceeds will be used

to pay for processing.

If you are interested in donating a live hog or calf, the school will accept either. They are also taking cash donations to help pay for processing of the animals, all of which as tax deductible.

When your student comes home after the first day of school, they will need you to sign the following forms and return them the next day, or they won't get their laptop the next morning for use in classes:


- Receipt of the student handbook



Mrs. Moninger figured out these numbers because the teachers would like to recognize the AR reader of the year for all grades. This is based on points only and it is not according to how many books read.

For many, they worry that students in grades K-2 won't get enough recognition, as most of them are still reading .5 point picture books. To help settle

this dispute, teachers in the lower grades do their own awards for number of picture books read each year. This will make sure everyone gets a medal no matter what.

RENOVATION PROJECT

We will have many changes for everyone to adjust to when the school opens it's doors to a new year in August.
