

Remodeled Gym Unveiled



The Arnold Gym has received a face lift. The gym floor was refinished by Dave Melchoir of Melchoir Contracting LLC in Sidney.

It took approximately two

weeks to finish. Two days of staining and five of thoes days was sanding, there was a lot of work to get to the bare boards. (jace Connell and Leighton Bubak even got to help with sanding.)

Mr. Mohr and some of the School House Graphic Students helped with the floor as they were stripping it and then

as they applied the graphics for the middle and lines for the volleyball and basketball.

"The stripping of the floors definitely brightened up the gym when they got down to the lighter color underneath the yellowing floor wax," said Mrs. Mohr.

"Dave Melchoir should be commended for his work. Even though the sanding took longer than expected and they redid some of the sanding in the three point area, he held true to his bid and saved the school a lot of money," said Mr. Mohr.

The floor will be finished off with new baseboard trim that

will be black.

The graphics students, with the help of Mr. and Mrs. Mohr are also recovering the mats at the end of the gym. (The graphic is at the bottom of this page.)

The scoreboards in both schools were also redone by Madison Reed and Olivia

Paulsen.

Before the first home game, a large United States flag and a large Nebraska flag will be hung on either side of the stage where the sponsor boards used to be. The sponsor boards will move to the east wall.



The school board looked at two different graphic proposals, one that is the traditional high school gym floor look with lots of color, and the other a more simple design and use of stain similar to what many universities are doing. After input from the coaches they decided upon the more collegiant look. In fact, Mr. Cole suggested the blue in the three point zone.

The students will come to a boot camp on the first couple of days of school, with Mrs. Badgley and Mr. Jageler. During that time, students will be given their new laptop, and they will go through the steps of handout.

The students will also go through a new lesson about online safety with their laptops and with other electronic devices. We will also review the school rules, and the consequences when someone is breaking the rules during school hours, and when they are off school grounds.

We will also go through some study skills demonstrations with their laptops, set up their foldering, printing, and passwords for the school year.
