Freshly popped popcorn, cool drinks, and mouthwatering candy greeted the kids at the door, as concessions were sold and served by volunteers from our small-town community.



Nerves coursed through the ten select students on the afternoon of January 10, as they knew they would soon be competing in the revamped local Arnold Geography Bee. The Bee began at 2 o'clock and was open for students, parents, and the public to attend.

The Arnold Junior Honor Society members were in charge of organizing the Geography Bee, as it was one of their biggest service projects of the year. With the help of AJHS organizer Mrs. Moninger, the Geography Bee was a terrific success with 8th grader Colbi Smith coming away with the win!

Earlier in the school year, students in grades 4-8 had a

class geography competition, and the winners from those class competitions moved on to the local round. Winning their class competitions were Paxton Bierman (4), Crew Witthuhn (4), Ella Cool (5) Rio Remund (6), Gracie Neth (6), Madison Smith (6), Silas Cool (7), Clay Witthuhn (7), Stella Lewis (8), and Colbi Smith (8).

Mr. Peterson, moderator of the Geography Bee, started the contest with an oral round of questions. To be eliminated from the competition, students had to incorrectly answer two questions. Due to this rule, all ten students, even those who answered incorrectly, moved on to the next round of difficult inquiries.

Round 2 was compiled of tough questions that each student answered by writing their response, on the white board they were provided with, within a 15



second time limit. The questions were progressively harder as the

competition moved on, and only four students, Rio Remund, Madison Smith, Crew Witthuhn, and Colbi Smith, moved on to round 3.

Round 3 was another oral round; however, it had an exciting twist. Each student was given a map with state lines and major road lines. The students were asked questions that regarded both the state and the roads. In this thrilling round of competition, the two challengers once again were given a limit of two errors, and any previous errors were no longer held against them. Smith and Witthuhn were asked three hard questions and once again wrote their response on the white boards they were provided with.
