### Young Students Attend Plum Creek Literacy Festival Ella Cool, 6th grader,





It all started with principal


Joel Morgan, who nominated him for the award. To be considered he had to describe his accomplishments and write a short essay.

insects that affect our crops.



The 3-D printer is just another incredible addition to the well-developed SHGP (School House Graphic Productions). The SHGP students are already progressing several new business ideas to use with the new 3-D printer. Lead developer on the 3-D printer, Logan Coleman, reported on some of the goals the school wants to accomplish with the help of the new equipment, "The new printer is really cool. There are really endless possibilities. Our possibilities range anywhere from creating re-



The students were taught about what was in an ambulance and what they should see if they were in one."

When Mrs. Hagler was asked was about the benefits of Fire Prevention day, she responded with, "It reminds them of things that they need to be aware of. Fire Prevention Day teachers make them aware of many important things, such as where possible exits out of different room are, including windows. Another valuable lesson is to not be scared of the Firefighters and EMS."



# From the **Superintendent's Desk**



Welcome November!

All Nebraska schools are required to have a safety committee, which

is required to meet annually to satisfy Rule 10 and other legislative initiatives. The team consists of school staff members, and establishes protocols for a variety of scenarios which assist us in ensuring that our students will remain safe should any adverse situation arise, from inclement weather to intruders. Each school in the state will have an NDE safety review this year, facilitated by State Patrol.

To prepare for our visit, Mr. Morgan and I recently attended the Nebraska School Safety and Security Summit. The summit introduced us to the Safety Response Protocol

(SRP) developed by the "I Love U Guys" Foundation, which can be located at http://iloveuguys. org/. The story of the foundation

is compelling, and worth reading. They offer a variety of materials to streamline school responses to situations.

Another topic you might hear of is the ReVISION grant process that APS is currently undergoing. This first year of the grant, we are planning and educating the public. Our first meeting with the team was attended by the Department of Labor and the NE Economic Development Corporation, as well as representatives from the NDE. There will be additional meetings held to gather public input, and then later to inform our citizens of our plans to align Career and Technology Education (CTE) standards to what we are doing at APS on a daily basis. This ReVISION process will assist us in pairing student needs and opportunities with the perceived needs of the economy of the region.
