## From the Superintendent's Desk

March 18th, 2020 was the last school day we had students in our building. We found ourselves changing how we live our lives on a daily basis in a short amount of time. As a school we took action in a way we best knew with the situation that was presented to us and was changing daily. The patience and support we received from parents and community was incredible and greatly appreciated. Thank you. I would like to thank the staff for their adaptability and willingness to do what was necessary during this time as well.

Since March, we have had a chance to plan and prepare for the 2020-2021 school year. At this time, we will be adhering to our current calendar with the first day of school on August 13th. I have had the opportunity to receive information

and guidance from the Nebraska Department of Education, local health departments, and other professionals to help gear up for the school year.

It is my hope to keep our school operating as normal as possible this school year. In order to do this, we will need to take some precautions to keep us safe and open. While I understand some of the actions we take may be an inconvenience and deviates from what we normally do, it will be necessary to ensure the safety of students and staff. A return to learning plan has been established to help with process. It is our desire that children be in school learning from their teachers.

While local health departments are using a risk dial for their district, we will utilize a risk dial that is



specific to Arnold Public Schools. This dial is color coded with green, yellow, orange, and red.

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# NHS Senior Project Uses Summer Wisely

Every year the National Honor Society seniors in Arnold do a project that will give back to the school or the community. Previous senior projects ranged from purchasing an industrial potato peeler for the school lunch program, purchasing books for the Finch Memorial Library and preparing for summer reading program needs, painting the golf course, refinishing the city park's bathroom floor, donating books for elementary class libraries, and maintaining welcome signs on the southern and western edges of Arnold.

This year, Kacee Dvorak was wondering if there was any way that they could decorate the state park entrance sign. When the seniors contacted Cheryl Carson with the AEDC, they discovered that the AEDC was already planning to do this, but needed workers to help them accomplish their goal. The seniors wrangled the rest of the students in NHS to help with this

big project.

This project taught NHS students about landscaping, plant design, and how to design block walls. The members of NHS are panning on hosting other projects throughout the summer and the school year!

## Upcoming Senior Projects

The next step in the NHS senior project is redesigning the welcome signs from the earlier senior project. When Carlene Lanham was sponsor, NHS members contacted landowners and the state of Nebraska with the proposal of creating welcome signs. The first signs were created around 2000. Shandell (Gunther) Shelton designed the current signs as part of her senior project as Arnold and Callaway began co-oping sports. Her design used the South Loup color scheme to show community support. That was over a decade ago and the signs are beginning to fade and peel so this year's seniors plan to update them.

Since the state verifies the signs are still being maintained annually, it is mostly a matter of deciding what design to use and raising the funds for the material. Clay and Julie

Mohr have always allowed NHS students who are trained in their graphics class to design and install the signs with donated labor so the funding is primarily material. Bailey Schwarz and Kacee Dvorak have both been trained through graphics and are heading this phase of the senior project.

To raise funds for the projects, the NHS is planning a car wash during SORC. The members have received approval from SORC and have contacted the fire department requesting permission to hold the car wash at the fire station. Members are currently making publicity signs, purchasing supplies, and planning a schedule to prepare for the event.

Other projects the seniors are planning focus on the school recycling program and academic recognition. The NHS also chairs an annual food drive to help our local food pantry.

## Junior Honor Society Projects

This year's Junior Honor Society also helped improve some of the local parks. Since COVID interrupted



the Community Clean Up that usually provides an opportunity to weed and mulch areas, the JHS members donated time to do those projects.

Cheryl Carson and Tiff Varney directed students on the needs for the Community Center and Koubek Gardens. Students who helped with this project included: Delaney Rogers, Gracie Neth, Ella Cool, William Moninger, Eli Rogers, and Malachi Neth.

The goal of the JHS is to build leaders, and seeing how the two groups approached their projects

definitely highlights that leadership development. Many of the annual traditions are used to develop leadership skills. The JHS and NHS often work together on projects to develop leadership; however, the JHS also creates their own service opportunities. Some of the projects that the two groups join forces in include fundraising ventures, the Easter Egg Hunt, helping with the Halloween Around Town, and elementary field day.

As JHS members see needs, they also create new projects. JHS members saw a need for childcare during parent teacher conferences a created a program for that. One of the favorite JHS projects is providing a fun and entertaining activity for junior high students. That activ-

ity varies, but has included a Escape Room activity at the Rialto Theater and the Clue in the School Lock In.

Just as NHS ends with a senior

project, the JHS culminates in a larger project. The JHS students graduate after the 9th grade year. As freshmen, the big project involves maintaining the school-wide recycling program. Students gather that paper and other recyclables weekly, weigh it, and take it to the recycling trailers. While that seems easy on paper, students must be very dedicated and organized to maintain the program the entire year. Ironically, the recycling program started as this year's seniors project as they saw the need to focus on recycling at school. The school recycling has changed through the purchase of paper bins, advertising the availability of recycling on game programs, and updating students on the recycling progress through the school newsletter.

taking along the way.

- Conduct temperature checks to all staff and students entering our building each day. Children riding the bus will have their temperature checked before getting on the bus. Parents will be contacted if their child is not allowed on the bus.
- Masks will be required for students and staff when our risk dial status is at orange.
- No outside visitors will be allowed. This includes parents volunteering or wanting to eat lunch with their children.
- Parent meetings with staff will still be allowed but need to be scheduled. A designated meeting

place will be established outside of the classroom.

- Parents dropping off materials and picking up students will be restricted to office access only.
- Social distancing will need to be followed during student drop off and pickup at beginning and end of the school day outside of the school.
- Frequent hand washing and use of hand sanitizer will be practiced.
- Social Distancing during the day to the extent of what our facilities will allow.
- Adhering to recommended isolation or quarantine from our local health departments.
- Parents will need to screen their children at home for symptoms. Please do not send your child to school if they are ill or running a temperature.

- Increased cleaning and sanitizing of the building and equipment.
- Bus seating will be assigned by family and distanced when possible.
- Stagger our release times for lunch and other events during the day.

The ability to keep our doors open and our building safe will critically depend on the cooperation and collaboration with students, staff, parents, and community. Communication will be a key part to our success. We will do our best to keep you informed to the extent that is allowed without violating the privacy of our students. I also encourage you to reach out if you have any concerns along the way.

# Teachers Team Up to Apply For Grants



Teamwork is not anything new for teachers within our faculty. They work together to provide the best learning opportunities for students when it comes to lessons and curriculum. They team up work on many other things too. This time, the team work paid off by receiving a total of \$2700.00 (\$2,100 for the gardens + \$600.00 for the Cricut

## Winner #1: Schoolhouse Gardens Project

Coming this fall, a new school-based business will start thanks to a grant that was applied for in mid-April. This John Russell Applegate Foundation Grant will be used to start the Schoolhouse Gardens Project.

In the new Ag-Bio science class, students will be researching, planting, and growing different vegetable and flower plants to sell. They will be running their own business and using the profits to expand the class.

“The new Ag-Bio class will be

a great opportunity to start the project. I wanted something to base the class around, something that the kids would be in charge of and learn a lot of real-life experiences from,” said Melissa Sandager, science teacher.

The grant provided the funds for the original grow systems, seeds, and materials needed. For the project to expand (which is the goal) students will fundraise and sell plants to keep the program going.

“Mr. Morgan and the school/community have been very sup-

portive of the program. Joel has given me freedom for the new class and the schoolhouse garden project. The community has been keen on the idea of the student run business and has already shown interest in supporting the students plant produce.”

Debby Moninger, librarian and English teacher, and Melissa Sandager, 7-12 Science teacher and former speech coach, worked together to begin two new projects this fall. They teamed up during the COVID work times to write two grants and managed to win both of them!

The new Ag-Bio Class will be an elective for students in grades 11-12. The equipment was ordered over the summer, and students will start planning for production as soon as school starts. The plants will be started later in the winter to be ready to be sold in the spring.

One of the many projects for schoolhouse Gardens is to grow and make flower pot arrangements for teacher appreciation week and Mother's Day. A future goal would be to offer small planters that could be purchased by students or husband's for Mother's Day as well.

This project is funded by a grant from the John Russell Applegate Fund administered by Mid-Nebraska Community Foundation.



The students will be growing different types of plants second semester after they create their business plans and set up their new class.

## Winner #2: School Library Makerspace

A second grant was received from the John Russell Applegate Foundation, managed by the Mid-Nebraska Community Foundation, to enhance the School Library Makerspace.

Moninger and Sandager submitted the grant by the April 15th deadline. They purchased: 2 -- Cricut Machines, 2 -- Cricut Essential Tool Sets, and several Cricut Cutting Mats, along with some fun card stock. The stations will be housed in the library for individual use as time allows.

Moninger is also using some of the memorial money from her parents (Ron and Donna Dunning) for the poster station storage furniture.

“We wanted to create a makerspace area for student use in classroom presentation posters for science, social studies, speech, and English. With the new stan-

dards, presentations have become a key component in many units. The cricket stations would allow students to personalize their work with professional appeal. In addition, teachers could use the space to create visuals for their classroom.”

The school will contribute supplies such as paper, rubber cement, scissors, etc. needed to maintain the stations.

Last year, Mrs. Moninger created an elementary-aged, science-based makerspace kits with a donation from the Arnold Education Association in Gerry Swingle's name. This Cricut grant will enable more students of all ages to begin to create.

# “Kitty Whisker” and “Play Me a Melody” the Colors of Redecorating

With about 25 people, 15 rooms, 5 quarts, and 49 gallons of paint, a fresh, clean look hit APS in 5 days. In this short period of time, the staff of APS renewed the look of many of the classrooms. The painting began in the last few years when new carpeting was put in the first and fourth grade classrooms.

This year the art room, kindergarten, first, second, third, fifth and sixth grade rooms got a new coat of paint. The third grade got a new accent wall, the 6th grade got rid of that orange color, and everyone went through and organized, fixed

furniture and painted shelves to match their new décor, trim, windows, etc. were all spruced up.

But the renovations didn't stop there.

- The Title one room was repainted and a new window installed.

- The counselor's office was repainted and the cabinets redone.

- The office received an

overhaul of new color, new trim color, new “used” furniture, carpeting, and cabinet makeovers.

- The HS resource room even received a bit of paint for the trim and accent pieces to include a pop of color.

- The science room's walls and trim were redone and the lab was freshened up a bit with some complicated painting and trimming.

However, the big story of the overhaul has to be the library and distance learning room up there. With the ceiling being almost two stories high it took a large crew to move all the bookshelves and furniture so they could paint the ceiling (thank you Mr. Peterson), the walls, and to redo the trim all around that massive room. Shelves were carefully unloaded and repainted. The storage closet in the back was reorganized and One Act storage moved to a better location, allowing for a small maker's space to take over that space for elementary students.

The Spanish distance learning room now looks even more like a classroom with more space, more tables, and a more modern, clean, fresh look to welcome students back in the fall.

The 5th grade room is getting new cubbies that Mr. Neth de-

signed using the C and C machine in the shop. Once they were done, Mr. Phelps “hired” Mr. Neth to help him make some for his classroom as well.

Of course, Ruth Tullis and Craig Furne were constantly on the move keeping the teaching staff supplied with everything they needed from paint, to brushes, to rollers, to paint trays, and tools. They removed shelves, took down old items that eventually didn't go back up, filled holes with plaster and spackling, helped move out furniture, recycled shelving into different rooms, helped with reorganizing, and so much more.

And we can't forget the efforts of Mr. Mohr who was pulled in all directions for scaffolding, tools, help redesigning, answering questions, helping with tracing wiring, and eventually building in some spots. He also worked on many other projects including trimming out doors, finishing the hallway between the old building and the new one.

Other projects Mr. Mohr and crew finished include:

- the record boards in the commons area
- Putting counters in Mr. Jageler's room
- Finishing the kitchen with drawer fronts and COVID serving

shields.

- Relaminating some cupboards
- Putting windows in the Shop, Elementary Resource, Title One and Art and re-stuccoing the outside.
- counters and stools in many new locations
- trimming out doors with wood
- finishing the drywall on the new elevator lift
- finishing the hooks in the Bobcat hallway, and more that we may have missed.

## Laptop Hand Out

This year things will be the same as last year for laptop check out. The parents will not be required to come to the school to sign papers. The students will come to a boot camp during the first couple of days of school with Mrs. Badgley and Mr. Jageler. During that time, students will be given their new laptop, and they will go through the steps of hand-out.

The students will also go through a lesson about online safety with their laptops and with other electronic devices. We will also review the school rules, the consequences when someone is breaking the rules during school hours, and when they are off school grounds.

We will also go through some study skills demonstrations with their laptops, set up their foldering, printing, and passwords for the school year.

When your student comes home after the first day, they will need you to sign the following forms and return them the next day, or they won't get their laptop the next morning for use in classes:

- Receipt of student handbook
- Acceptable Use Policy
- Computer Loan Agreement form

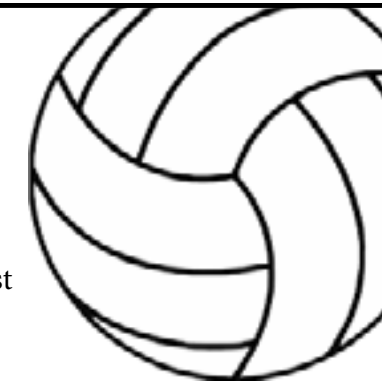
