has been working hard in many
different efforts to improve the high

school weight room.

The motivation that led Rio to want to move forward with this was, "I felt that the status of our weight room was limiting the success of our athletic programs."

Rio wrote three major grants, approached several local organizations, and spoke with administration many times, as well as the school board.

He has received many grants to get money for this improvement including: Mid Nebraska Community Foundation for \$2,500. The Arnold School Foundation for \$2,000, the Arnold Boosters Club for \$1,500, the School Board for approximately \$4,000, the Arnold Community Foundation for a total of \$12,500, and the Scott B. Cool Foundation for

\$500. and also the NHS Senior Project is purchasing the floor mats for \$1,580.

Rio has received nearly 55% of his budget for these improvements. The reason for these certain improvements will benefit the students by allowing them to have access to a safe environment to better themselves while at school.

This project has been something that students and coaches have been pushing for years. Rio actually started



to really put together a stable plan after the Burwell wrestling meet in December after a conversation with Mr. Morgan.

The largest and most specific area that Rio is most wanting to improve is the flooring and the squat racks. However due to the large amount of support for the project we will be able to have completely renovated the whole weight room.





4th Grade learns about Nebraska Quilt

On Wednesday, February 15, 2023 the Arnold Public School's 4th Grade class had a visitor come to their classroom. The students had the honor of getting to learn about and see the quilt that the Custer's last stitch quilt guild group has worked on putting together about nebraska. The group of ladies who had come to present the quilt to the class, had been working on this for about 2 years. Normally it only takes about a week but it took longer, because they did not know what and how. They were going to interpret all the information about Nebraska into pictures. Once it was completed they made each part of the quilt to have a meaning of how

people were required to tear up land in order to live. And then use the land to build their houses on the plains. A majority of this quilt was the aspects of how in 1867 Nebraska became a state. Lincoln NE is where our state capital is located, and what it is intended to represent and this is presented on the famous quilt. The union pacific railroad in the state of Nebraska was mentioned and is represented by what it does and when it originally began. In the state of Nebraska there is a total of 453 total miles of interstate. Cranes of Nebraska migration and how far they travel and throughout a year nearly half a million travel through Nebraska a year. The state of Nebraska has a total of 24 miles of rivers and streams, and has the

most of any state. Nebraska is the second largest ethanol producing state in the country. Halsey is the only national forest that was man made in the state of Nebraska. In the state of Nebraska we have a famous bird, flower and tree. These include the Western Medilack, Golden Rock, and the Cottonwood. When completed with the presentation 4th graders had the opportunity to document their name on the quilt. This group of ladies is located out of Discover Nebraska and Custer's last stitch quilt guild. At the end they also had the opportunity to then color a picture of each of the quilt squares and make their own quilt as a class.
