featured electric defensive and
offensive drives from both sides of
the ball.

To begin the battle, the Knights kicked off to the Bobcats. The Bobcats wasted no time getting on the scoreboard as senior Trey Connell rushed for his night's first touchdown. Though, the quick score would be the only one of the quarter as both the Knights and the Bobcats faced offensive troubles. The defense of both teams ensured a dogfight was to continue the rest of the night.

This trend of great defense would go on throughout the second quarter until Sandhills Thedford finally found themselves on the board, tying the game up 6-6. The Bobcats, desperately needing a response, found themselves getting into the end zone once again after quarterback Trey Connell connected with teammate Cache Gracey for a 50-yard touchdown pass. After getting the two-point conversion, the Bobcats found themselves get-

ting a stop on defense, allowing another opportunity to gain a larger lead on the knights. With just 17 seconds left in the half, Trey Connell would scramble for his third touchdown, giving the Bobcats a 20-6 lead over the Knights.

To begin the third quarter the Bobcats would kickoff to the Knights. The halftime break shifted the game however from all defense to all offense as neither team would stop the other from having long, rewarding drives. This left the third quarter a wash, with both teams scoring 16.

The fourth quarter was no different as both teams continued

to punish the other's defense. The quarter would go on to once again be a wash, as both teams scored 12, leaving the Bobcats with the last laugh getting the only defensive stop of the game allowing them to milk the clock. The South Loup Bobcats protected their home field beating the Knights with an ending score of 48-34. Stat leaders of both teams would be Trey Connell of the Bobcats with 313 rushing yards on 38 attempts, Kyle Cox of the Knights with 185 yards throwing on 22 attempts, and South Loup sophomore Crew Witthuhn with 16 tackles.
