

High School is adding a few classes to kick off next year's fall semester with the intention of gaining the interest of students and adapting to classes that the students will want to learn. Production continued this summer, following the work of Elijah Cool, Wacey Schultz, and Malachi Neth who welded their way into the greenhouse.

The raised garden beds may have taken time, but the three who boys who have dedicated so much time to the project have a lot to be proud of. Elijah Cool, Wacey Schulz and Malachi Neth have designed, created a prototype, tested and built 3 of the 8 ft. x 2 ft. x 36" inch high garden beds and have 5 more to finish.

They still need to add a couple more supports, and will add the pvc boarding that will line the inside. They will also be installing the drip lines along the bottoms of the beds before they are installed.

Each of these 8 foot beds will be able to hold a ton of dirt each in the 20-inch-deep beds. There will be seven of those tables running along the perimeter of the building.

There will be a total of about 13 tables. Of those 13, one is cut and half assembled, as of the end of May. Three were waiting to be lined - as seen in the picture above,

and two are completely built in the greenhouse

There will also be 6, 4x8 tables for the center of the building. Each of them will hold 2 tons of dirt.

Two are completely built in the greenhouse and three are ready for liners. The last is still being welded.

Malachi is looking forward to working for the school this summer to get them done. Eli Hunt and Wacy will help when they can in between other school projects.

As they have been working They have gone through two steel diamond coated metal saw blades so far cutting the supports for the tables and they have used 4400 lbs of steel, 50 4x8 sheets of PVC liner cut to fit.

"They're my A-team in this project Isaac did an incredible job keeping things stocked and keeping the assembly process moving forward," said Clay Mohr. "The

freshmen have really honed their welding skills. I appreciate their willingness to come in extra time to get this done.

The sophomore construction tech crew worked hard in the erection of the greenhouse and working in the inside," continued Mohr.

The summer crew will work on running the water lines to the beds from the quick disconnect to avoid moving hoses and set up the aquaphonics.

"This is a very big undertaking for high school kids and most are underclassmen except for the leadership of Issac Tickle. These boys are leaving a legacy. They designed and built. They made the prototype and planned the production process. Forty years down the road they can return and the tables will still be in use. They are that good," said Mohr.



New School Improvement Goals!

ARNOLD: Arnold Public School is going into year two of the school improvement cycle.

Arnold Public School started the implementation of the MTSS process for grades K-12. For the school year of 2024-2025, they will be implementing the MTSS process for preschool as well.

They began the first year of the new elementary reading curriculum, WONDERS 2023, this year and it was implemented for grades K-5.

"The new implementation of WONDERS is going well. With every new curriculum, there come some bumps and roadblocks, but each teacher has taken those challenges head-on with a very positive attitude and worked closely as a team and with ESU 10 to overcome those challenges," said Principal Alison Goodenow.

Next year in the 2024-2025 school year, WONDERS will be implemented for grades K-6th grade.

ment an evidence-based strategy that helps with the implementation of WONDERS and utilizes all that it offers with fidelity. Our elementary teachers have had two different training days with ESU where they used those days as work days to work ahead on the slide decks that they will be used for each unit pre-



sented in WONDERS. There will be other districts moving forward who work with our district in completing the remainder of the units that need slide decks finished".

Arnold Public Schools will also have a new ELA curriculum for grades 7-8. The new curriculum for grades 7-8 is Study Sync through McGraw Hill. This is the next step up from WONDERS and has the same language, routines, and


expectations as our K-6 reading curriculum

Mrs. Goodenow was asked what improvements has she seen in year three of the new

math curriculum, EnVision, and she responded, "Looking at the data on our summative, formatives, and state testing, we can see that when the curriculum is being taught to fidelity there are HUGE results. EnVision has been beneficial for our district and we are pleased with the results that we have seen over the last three years."


